Since April, World Vets has placed some of their 3500 volunteer vets from around the world on the ground in Japan to work with local Japanese animal advocacy and rescue groups to provide veterinary attention to the many displaced, homeless, and abandoned animals in the stricken areas. Almost-Deployments & Transports

Since the last newsletter in March, WASART's 24/7 designated phone number of 425-681-5498 has been ringing off the hook—well, almost off the hook. In seven days, requests for assistance were received from frantic horse owners in Island and Skagit Counties, and from the local Fire Department in Grays Harbor County. While the incidents were resolved before WASART Field Response teams deployed,



it was gratifying to see that WASART's name and its capabilities are becoming more known throughout western Washington. Which is just the way WASART — and our animal friends and their owners — like it!

Then, one week later and on three consecutive days, three more calls were received from a local agency asking WASART's assistance in transporting some animals from one location to another. Again, WASART was happy to receive the request and to have the resources available to respond to the appeals.

Non-WASART Trainings

On **April 1, 2011, Carol Satre** attended King County's **Disaster Mental Health** training in Seattle. The class focused on ways to maintain adaptive functioning as well as how to prevent and reduce the physical and behavioral health consequences of a disaster. The day was organized into three main sections: preparedness, response, and recovery after a disaster. The leaders led the attendees through helpful breathing techniques that could be used to



lower one's anxiety after a stressful disaster. In addition, the attendees were reminded that as a response volunteer, the responder cannot help anything or anybody who will not help themselves. Carol reported that the class was very informative and recommended that any disaster responder take the class if it is offered again in the future.

WASART's General Meetings are currently held each quarter on the **2nd Wednesday of each quarter** at **7:00 p.m**. Another WASART member, Marie Schimke, spent April 3-8, 2011 in Anniston, Alabama attending the





AgERT-B course (Basic Agriculture Emergency Response Training) offered by FEMA's Center for Disaster Preparedness (CDP). AgERT-B is only one of over 50 courses offered to emergency responders by the CDP. These courses focus on incident management,



mass casualty response, and emergency response to natural disasters or terrorists acts. The daily sessions were packed with class lectures, practical exercises, and team-building opportunities. This particular AgERT class was comprised of 40 emergency responders from all over

the United States. After four days of training, they were divided into teams of eight to rehearse a biochemical deployment utilizing the ICS (Incident Command Structure) for a final exam. Marie's team consisted of four vets, two firefighters, and two



police officers with Marie acting as a 'clean tech' on animal blood and innards samples. The culmination of AgERT-B was

graduation and certificates. Marie now joins the very select group of **Cathy Reaney**, **Pat Conaway**, and **Heidi Kuester** who also graduated from this program and who have utilized the training they received to teach awareness level courses to the WASART general membership.



On March 31, 2011-April 1, 2011, two instructors from the University of Tennessee College of Veterinary Medicine flew to Seattle to teach a FEMA-sponsored 12-hour course entitled "Use of a Standardized Credentialing"

Program for Management of an Animal Emergency and Response". The course was hosted jointly by WASART and the King County Office of Emergency Management, Region 6, in a location selected by the City of Auburn. It was attended by over 35 emergency managers from several cities from within the State as well as representatives from FEMA, Public Health, Seattle Animal Shelter, Regional Animal Services of King County, vets, etc., From WASART, Gretchen McCallum, Rory Kelleher, Bill Daugaard, Greta Cook, Lanette Knapp, and Jennifer Rollins attended as well. All agreed the instruction and the course material provided important information on which to base future planning in emergencies or disasters in which animals are involved.

For the third year in a row, WASART members attended Tom Berryman's annual Large Animal Extrication Class in Rochester, WA. The class was held on April 16, 2011 and among the 16 attendees were JoDee Craigmile-Nilsen, Kathie Burr, and Amy Adams. They join the approximately 25 other WASART members who have attended this class. The class is designed to teach emergency responders and others how to use rescue equipment and how to safely prepare for and approach large animal incidents. Besides practicing knot work, first on toy



animals and then on live horses and cattle, the trainees observed a demonstration on how to properly contain and control animals inside a wrecked trailer, how to roll a horse caught upside down or over the edge of a steep terrain, and how to right a trailer flipped onto its side. As always, the class was informative and well taught. It is held every year in April and is always posted on the WASART calendar. Donations from this class are applied towards new/updated equipment for the West Thurston Regional Fire Authority, which co-sponsors this class with the Thurston Fire & Rescue Training Consortium.



The demonstration, by **Bill Daugaard**, **Greta Cook**, **Rory Kelleher**, **Lauri McBeath-Davies** and **Fred Knight**, will show how to safely and effectively extract a large animal such as a horse or llama from a ditch or well then transport it in a recumbent position on a rescue glide to another location.
