Just in time for Star Wars, we had a rescue of a horse named after a Star Wars character. Like the character, Anakin has an amazing backstory. See the link at the end of the article for more!

On Saturday December 5, WASART was called to assist in raising a horse who was down in Winlock, Washington. A woman had rescued two horses only a couple of days before from a situation where neither horse was getting enough to eat. The thinner one, an 18 year old Thoroughbred gelding named Anakin, was down and could not get himself up due to his depleted condition, lack of muscle, and the cold weather. It has been cold and raining a lot in western Washington, which only worsened the situation — cold muscles do not work well.

Fortunately there was a WASART team about an hour away with the rescue van, WASART 2. They diverted to Winlock and, with the help of neighbors, the Becker sling, and the Häst tripod, were able to get the horse up and standing on his own — a good sign. Anakin was checked by a vet and his rescuer planned to continue working to get him back to a normal weight.

Then Monday, Anakin was down again. About 11 a.m. WASART responders headed back to Winlock. An attempt was made to roll him, so that his legs were on the downhill side, as that will often give a horse a chance to stand on their own. After this was unsuccessful, the team set up the tripod and the sling again. We were able to raise him, and he stood on his own.

Throughout the rescue effort Anakin was calm and munching hay if there was any within reach. For those of you unfamiliar with horses, most do not like things going on above them; Anakin did not seem to care. He was also producing manure, a very good sign.

Meanwhile, others were were working to find a better situation for Anakin, who will need extra care while he recovers. It would be too much work for one person to handle on their own. Fortunately <u>Save a Forgotten Equine</u> (S.A.F.E.) offered to take him.

Once he was up and seemed stable on his feet, we removed the blankets so that his condition could be evaluated, then we replaced them with clean, dry blankets. Once Anakin demonstrated that he could walk around without much trouble, we started breaking down the lifting equipment and stowed it in WASART 2.

After all that Anakin had been through, we all agreed that immediately hauling him all the way to S.A.F.E., in Woodinville — about a two hour drive under good conditions — was not the best idea. Fortunately a neighbor just down the road provided a dry arena where Anakin spent the night, a much shorter and less stressful trailer ride.

On Tuesday Anakin made the rest of the journey to S.A.F.E. They report that his outlook is positive. S.A.F.E. will see that Anakin is brought back to a normal weight under close veterinary supervision.

A big thanks go to the caring person who rescued him, her friend who found him in that situation, Valhalla Canine Rescue (who live just down the street and were there to help with haul lines), and S.A.F.E.

It turns out that there was a reason that Anakin was so calm amidst all the activity. Read his amazing backstory S.A.F.E. researched here: <a href="https://www.safehorses.org/?p=21600">https://www.safehorses.org/?p=21600</a>

On a related note, the second horse, Silver, was neglected as well, just not as much as Anakin. His rescuer doesn't think she can give him the care he needs to return to good health, and is having a hard time locating a rescue for him. 
