to make difficult decisions. We are given the gift of their trust to give their four-legged family member on last chance. We have done our best.

We also notice patterns in calls. Last year, we had three calls in a row of different horses stuck in different ravines in Whatcom County within a 24 hour period. One call even came in while we were on the phone with the owner of another.

Recently the pattern seems to be these below-theradar deployments we've decided not to publicize in our usual storytelling manner. Here are some of them:

- A horse went down and was unable to use his hind legs. The difficult decision was made to euthanize. While we waited for the vet, a responder fed the horse her snack of melon, which the owner said was the horse's favorite, so the horse would have one last bit of kindness.
- A woman rescued a starving horse from a kill lot and called us when the horse went down. The vet and the owner decided to euthanize the horse while we were en route.
- A teenager called us because her cat had apparently lifted a heating vent and crawled into the ductwork. Responders suited up in Tyvek protective suits, crawled under the house. They used mirrors and lights after disassembling strategic bits of ductwork to find the cat. The cat was never found, but we did find non-pet rats under the house.
- A horse died down a difficult slope between two trees. We assisted the owner by moving the horse to a more accessible place so she could manage the remains as she saw fit.
- Immediately after moving the dead horse, a homeless man contacted us about a cat he'd lost.
   We met him on site to evaluate the situation and found he had been hearing the cat for the last nine

days and had several ideas about what had happened. Responders did not hear the cat he insisted continued to vocalize loudly. We listened to him and his concerns and waited with him until Roaming Paws arrived with a cat search dog to clear accessible areas of concern.

## Second AKC Trailer Dedication



A big thanks to the AKC, 10 local AKC clubs, and the Invisible Fence Company for their generosity in securing this trailer for us.

Not once but twice the American Kennel Club Reunite has deemed WASART an animal welfare organization worthy of being the recipient of another donated brand new 16' trailer fully stocked with supplies and equipment to set up an emergency shelter for up to 65 dogs.

It has been over 12 months since the first trailer arrived. It was dedicated at the Seattle Kennel Club's Annual Dog Show at Centurylink Field on March 13, 2016. The second trailer was dedicated on November 19, 2016 at the Whidbey Island Kennel Club's 60th Anniversary Dog Show at the Evergreen State Fairgrounds, Monroe, WA. These trailers are the only ones of their kind in the greater Puget Sound, with one being staged in Enumclaw, WA and the other further north in Snohomish, WA.

Both trailers are the result of many dog breed organizations and kennel clubs in Washington contributing to the AKC Pet Disaster Relief Trailer Program. Like the first trailer, this trailer is fully stocked with the supplies and equipment needed to set up emergency animal shelters and to support and reunite pets after disasters such as floods and earthquakes.

Because of the generosity of so many organizations, WASART and Washington State are now in a better position to more quickly and efficiently respond to disasters that affect animals and their owners. We are grateful for the support.

New Experiences for Ropes with Experience

When it comes to dog leashes, WASART has created something any four-legged friend would be proud to wear. Handcrafted by fellow WASART members, these leashes were made from retired rescue ropes used by our technical rescue team. Once a lifeline between our team and an animal in distress, they can now be the lifeline between you and your pet. Each leash has a high quality bolt snap on one end with a sturdy handle on the other, reinforced with stitching and paracord whipping. With two sizes and four colors to choose from, there are plenty of options for everyone.

During a season where we count our blessings, we can't help but think back on the many reunions between animal and owner, animals like Tucker, that may have found themselves on the other end of

these ropes, and recognize that none of it would be possible without you. Thank you.

Tucker's owner sent us this update: "Thank you so much for your help is rescuing our 16 year old Australian Cattle Dog mix, Tucker, from the ravine behind our home last year. He's doing amazingly well for a 16 year old and we now have a fence in place so that he can continue to roam around the back yard without worrying about his balance/eyesight and hearing issues."

# Celebrate Giving Tuesday With WASART

This past year, WASART was able to add a tripod and a box van to its list of equipment. These vital pieces of equipment enhanced the safety of our responders, and greatly impacted our capability to respond to larger animals and more complex situations. The tripod proved to be invaluable from the first time WASART used it to give Anakin the horse a much needed lift to a 450 pound pet pig who couldn't manage to get on her feet. Thankfully, we also had the newer box van which, due to its size and maneuverability, allowed us to access these animals with ease. Currently, WASART deploys to all calls from a vehicle staging area in the south Puget Sound area near Enumclaw. Moving forward, WASART's goal is to have these capabilities staged in locations north and south of Seattle in order to reduce response times and avoid Seattle traffic which can add hours to the transit time.

This Giving Tuesday, we hope to reach \$5,000 in 24 hours.
