Pregnant Cow Retrieved from Creek Side

On Sunday, March 31 at 9:40 AM, WASART received a call for assistance for a pregnant cow near Shelton, Washington. She had become stuck in the mud near a creek after escaping her pasture.

Duty Officer Gretchen M. contacted the caller and determined that WASART would be able to help. A call was put out for available responders to handle technical rescue, animal handling, and base support. By 10:30 AM responders began to call in and we had enough people to proceed.

Responders began to arrive onsite a few minutes after noon; Strike Team Lead Tammy S. began to

The WASART equipment trailer arrived onsite at about 12:30 PM. Our first task was to determine where Molly Moo's hind legs were. They were not visible, and if we tried to move her with her legs trapped, we could injure her. With the owner's help and some digging, we freed one leg and determined that the other was not stuck.

We formed a main plan and a contingency plan. First, we would roll Molly onto the glide and attempt to pull her up a small hill to an area with firm ground where we could set up the tripod and assist her to her feet. If that didn't work, we would set up a bipod half way up the slope to lift and swing Molly to higher, firmer ground.

Fortunately, the first plan worked. We rigged Molly with a forward assist strap and two lifting straps before rolling her onto the glide and packaging her in. With the help of a few slip sheets, we pulled the glide up to level, firm ground without mechanical advantage. A popup cover had been set up to provide shade for Molly. In addition the technical team had the tripod assembled and ready to move over the cow.

At this point Molly was showing some signs of distress from laying on her side on the glide. We took the time to get her sternal (on her belly) before proceeding. She was much happier that way, more alert and aware. She eagerly took water and a little food offered by her owners.

The tripod was moved into place as the popup was removed, the spreader bar was attached to the lifting straps and rope system. Molly was slowly lifted to her feet. On the first attempt we had to lower her and change the rigging a little, which happens sometimes.

Two more lift and rest cycles did not enable Molly to

area where the owners could check on her frequently during the night. A vet was expected on Monday.

The team decontaminated some of the larger equipment and packed up. We wished Molly the best and departed the scene.

Ropes 1 Onboards Technical Rescue Team Members




The team in WASART that trains the most can also be the most intimidating to join. Training monthly, members who attend technical rescue training on a regular basis pick up a long list of skills that may feel impossible for new members to know where to start.

To give members an easier entry point, we introduced the Ropes 1 class two years ago. The class, taught by WASART's technical rescue team, goes through common concepts such as mechanical advantage and introduces core skills like knot tying. Combining class room training and hands-on practice, students are set up to join the instructors as teammates in future monthly trainings.

This year's two-day class was attended by six students and enough technical rescue team members to make the student-to-instructor ratio 1:1, allowing for a personalized experience for everyone.

A big thanks to the Martha Lake Fire Station in Lynnwood, WA, for letting us hold the class at their wonderful facility.
